On Sunday, May 5 Bishop Hying will confer the Holy Spirit upon nearly 70 young men and women of our Pastorate in the Sacrament of Confirmation. The Mass will be celebrated at Saint Dennis Church at 4:00 p.m. All are invited to gather in support and prayer of the Confirmandi as they become fully-initiated members of our Church.

We are grateful to all who were a part of the formation of these young members of our parish, particularly their parents, godparents and sponsors. To those who are being Confirmed: Congratulations! In the prayer of Confirmation:

Send your Holy Spirit upon them to be their helper and guide.

Give them the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of right judgment and courage, the spirit of knowledge and reverence.

Fill them with the spirit of wonder and awe in your presence.

AMEN

There are two special instances of the use of Amen that seem to call for separate treatment. The first is the Amen formerly spoken by the people at the close of the great Prayer of Consecration in the liturgy. The second is that which was uttered by each of the faithful when he received the Body and Blood of Christ.

Amen after the consecration: When we consider the "great Prayer of Consecration" a few words of explanation are necessary. There can be no doubt that for the Christians of the earlier ages of the Church the precise moment of the conversion of the bread and wine upon the altar into the Body and Blood of Christ was not so clearly apprehended. This is because back then and until the 1960's Mass was being celebrated in Latin, a language not popularly understood in all places.

They were satisfied to believe that the change was wrought in the course of a long "prayer of thanksgiving" (known to us as the Eucharistic prayer), a prayer made up of several elements - preface, recitation of the words of institution, memento for living and dead, invocation of the Holy Spirit, etc. - which prayer they nevertheless conceived of as one "action" or consecration, to which, after a doxology, they responded by a solemn Amen, an Amen that is to the fullest extent possible sung by the people as the great response to the gift of the presence of the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ now present on the altar.

Amen after communion: The Amen which in many liturgies is spoken by the faithful at the moment of receiving Holy Communion, that is the Amen spoken after the Minister of the Eucharist shows the hosts and says "The Body of Christ," may also be traced back to early century usage. It was a common practice in the early Church that when anyone received Communion they responded Amen, and then kissed the hand of the bishop who had brought it to them.

The point for us to consider is that the practice of answering Amen traces back to the early centuries, in fact the first and second centuries, when nearly all of the Church fathers make a reference to supplying an illustration of this common practice. In this instance, we are affirming that we do believe it is truly the Body and Blood of Christ. It is a little word, Amen, which indicates a strong affirmation, and translates in our present terminology as "let it be so"



CARE FOR CREATION

Planet Vs. Plastic – Environment and Health Effects

"The word environment means what surrounds you. In the case of plastics we



Plastics extend beyond an imminent environmental issue; they present a threat to animal and human health as alarming as climate change. As plastics break down into micro plastics, they release toxic chemicals into our food and water sources and circulate through the air we breathe. Plastic production now has grown to more than 380 million tons per year. More plastic has been produced in the last ten years than in the entire 20th century, and the industry plans to grow explosively for the indefinite future.

More than 500 billion plastic bags - one million bags per minute - were produced worldwide last year. Many plastic bags have a working life of a few minutes, followed by an afterlife of centuries. Even after plastics disintegrate, they remain as micro plastics, minute particles permeating every niche of life on the planet.

How Do We Encounter These Chemicals?

Chemicals are found in many everyday products, including some cosmetics, food and beverage packaging, toys, carpet, and pesticides. Contact with these chemicals may occur through air, diet, skin, and water. While they cannot be completely avoided or removed, you can make informed choices to reduce exposure and risk of any potential health effects. Source – EarthDay.org.

SAINT MARIA FAUSTINA KOWALSKA

"When I went out into the garden, I saw how everything was breathing the joy of spring. The trees, adorned with flowers, gave off an intoxicating odor. Everything was throbbing with joy and the birds were singing and chirping their adoration of God and said to me, 'Rejoice and be happy, Sister Faustina.'" (Diary, 1120)



MAY CROWNING

May Crowning is a cherished tradition within the Catholic Church. During this joyful occasion, children don their First Communion attire or their Sunday best, gather to sing in honor of the Blessed Mother, and present her with spring's

first flowers. The crowning moment involves placing a small wreath of blossoms upon her head. Typically held at schools and parishes, May Crowning celebrates the beauty and devotion to Mary.

The origins of this custom trace back through history. Iconographical motifs, such as paintings and sculptures, depict Christ crowning His mother after her Assumption into Heaven. The practice of crowning Mary sculptures or images dates back even further, with an example from Pope Gregory III (731-741) who donated a golden diadem to crown a holy image at Saint Peter's. This image represented not only Mary but also Christ and other saints.

In the 14th century, the tradition of crowning became more widespread, particularly in Essen, Germany, and Boerglum, Sweden. The Servite Order also customarily crowned well-known Marian images on Holy Saturday. Over time, the custom spread further during the Counter-Reformation, with the Vatican overseeing the financing of crowning ceremonies for venerable and miraculously recognized images.

Interestingly, the practice of crowning Mary with wreaths has roots in medieval courtly love rituals. A wreath of red (symbolizing motherhood) and white (representing virginity) roses would adorn Mary's head, signifying a declaration of love. This wreath of roses is connected to the historical roots of the rosary. Eventually, the wreath of flowers transformed into a wreath of prayers.

The May Crowning tradition, where Mary is crowned with flowers, highlights a special connection with spring, new life, and Mary's resplendent beauty. In summary, devotions like May Crowning have little magisterial direction; they emerge from popular practices, traditions, and heartfelt expressions of faith.

My friend and fellow pastor, Father Paul, noticed unsightly, overgrown

trees near his parish church. He asked the maintenance crew to cut back the growth, which they happily did, telling him the trees would be much healthier and even fuller after a good pruning. A few days later, Father Paul received a letter from an irate man in the neighborhood who wrote, "Jesus would never prune trees like that. He loves trees, unlike you."

I suspect that the neighbor was not familiar with this week's Gospel in which Jesus says of his Father, "He removes every branch in me that bears no fruit. Every branch that bears fruit he prunes to make it bear more fruit." (John 15:2) I do not mean to pick too much on that fellow. He was perhaps ignorant of arboriculture. But I would wager his main confusion was the pruning and removing quality of God's love. That confusion afflicts us all to some degree, does not it? It is just so darn easy to react negatively when God cuts something out of our lives and assumes it is not his work at all. In the moment, all we see is the loss, and not the loving desire for future flourishing.

The cross is the great pruning of Christ's body. Jesus' rising is the brand-new growth. It is God's promise to us that all the painful pruning in life is leading us somewhere beautiful. What has been cut back or out in your life? A friend, an opportunity, a sense of certainty, a job, health, a relationship? This week, offer those dry branches to the one who lovingly prunes us in order to make our lives burst with verdant growth.
